UPDATED! On February 14th, Round 1 of the Fiscal Year 2006 Legacy Resource Management Program funding was approved by the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Installations and Environment. Fifty projects – 20 cultural resources projects and 30 natural resources projects – were included in Round 1. Notification to successful applicants took place via email form February 15-17. We're working hard on prioritizing a Round 2 list, and hope to have more projects approved in the coming months. NEW! Funding Available For Environmental Technology Demonstration And Validation DoD, through the Environmental Security Technology Certification Program (ESTCP), supports the demonstration and validation of environmental technologies that address priority DoD environmental requirements. The goal of ESTCP is to transition mature environmental Science and Technology projects to receive regulatory and DoD end-user acceptance and to

be fielded and commercialized more rapidly.

ESTCP is seeking pre-proposals from DoD organizations as well as non-DoD Federal organizations and the private sector as described below. **Pre-proposals are due by Thursday, March 9.** Detailed instructions for are available on the ESTCP website: http://www.estcp.org/opportunities.

DoD organizations (Service and Defense Agencies) may submit pre-proposals for demonstrations of innovative environmental technologies in the following topic area:

<u>Sustainable Infrastructure</u> — natural resources management (e.g., ecosystem management, threatened and endangered species, invasive species), facilities management (e.g., solid waste, noise, water/air quality), and **detection and evaluation of cultural resources**.

The Broad Agency Announcement is seeking proposals from Non-DoD federal organizations and the private sector for environmental technologies in the following area:

Range Sustainment—Treatment and control technologies are sought that specifically address the remediation or containment of range-related contaminants and residue such as metals, energetics, and propellants (e.g., perchlorate). Control technologies are also sought for land rehabilitation to control erosion, excess sediment loading and off-site sediment movement due to training activities. Remedial and control technologies that allow for continued range operation during technology implementation, are deployable over large areas, or can serve to sustain areas subject to continued use are of particular interest. Characterization technologies are sought to cost effectively detect and delineate range

contaminants in surface soils and groundwater.

NEW! The National Park Service in partnership with the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Institute of Museum and Library Services is seeking applicants for its Save America's Treasures 2006 grant program. Save America's Treasures makes critical investments in the preservation of our nation's most significant cultural treasures. Grants are awarded for preservation and/or conservation work on nationally significant intellectual and cultural artifacts and nationally significant historic structures and sites. Grant amounts range from \$25,000 to \$700,000 to conserve collections and from \$125,000 to \$700,000 for historic property and sites projects. All the awards must be matched 1:1. Complete guidelines, applications and information, as well as a database of previous Save America Treasure's awardees, can be found on the National Park Service website. NEW! The Historic Structures I: Maintenance and Repair course will be held in Seattle, Washington, from March 13-17. This course provides an awareness of the unique characteristics, legal requirements, procedures, technical knowledge, and skills necessary to maintain and repair historic properties of the Federal Government. The course will address (a) Guidance: laws, regulations, and criteria; (b) identification and documentation of historic fabric; (c) maintenance issues: maintenance goals and reasons for deterioration; (d) procedures for maintenance design, management, and treatment; (d) design issues, including exterior finishes, interiors, life safety, energy conservation, engineering support systems, force protection, sustainable design, site design and landscaping, and material life cycle value; and (f) field trip: design and treatment techniques. Introduction to Cultural Resources Management – Laws & Regulations Course. This three-day course provides an integrated overview of all pertinent laws and regulations needed to understand and fulfill cultural resource management responsibilities. The course is taught in conjunction with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, and the sponsor for this course is the Navy Federal Preservation Officer. This ISEERB-approved course is ACHP recognized, and the total course length is 24 hours. The course is scheduled for March 14-16 in Atlanta, Georgia, and August 15-17 in New London, Connecticut. UPDATED! The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's course, **The Section 106**Essentials, offers participants an in-depth look at historic preservation responsibilities under the National Historic Preservation Act. The first course in 2006 will be held **March 20-21** in **Concord, New Hampshire**; other dates/locations include **April 25-26** in **San Juan, Puerto Rico**, and **May 31 - June 1** in **Washington, DC**. The Joint Services Environmental Management Conference will be held March 20-24, in Denver, Colorado. The theme of 2006 JSEM is *Transformation*, highlighting the many new and innovative ways the Department of Defense, other Federal agencies, states, the defense industry, and our partners are transforming how we are meeting our mission needs while protecting the environment. Two sessions related to DoD CRM are planned: "Integrating Cultural Resources and GIS: Asset Accountability and Management Opportunities" looks at increasing and standardizing the use of GIS for better cultural resources management. The "Managing DoD Cultural Resources" session is targeted at non-specialists working in the DoD CRM field, as well as professional managers overseeing CRM personnel and programs. It will include introductory presentations on the role of CRM in support of the military mission as well as updates from CRM professionals from all echelons talking about their work. WHO OWNS THE PAST? Heritage Rights and Responsibilities in a Multicultural World - 2nd Annual Ename International Colloquium will be held 22-25 March in Ghent, Belgium. A special feature of this year's colloquium will be a day of Round Table discussions focused on practical problem-solving and the formulation of innovative approaches to public heritage. All interested colloquium participants, including archaeologists, historians, heritage administrators, cultural technologists, and specialists in cultural property law are invited to submit 250-500 word case studies on particular heritage problems they have encountered in their research or professional experience. These case studies will provide the basis for the Round Table discussions and a selection of these case studies will be published in fuller form in the colloquium proceedings. Goucher College presents A Critical Look at Authenticity and Historic Preservation: the Fifth National Forum on Historic Preservation Practice will be held **March 23-25** in **Baltimore**, **Maryland**. The forum explores the meaning of authenticity in historic preservation through 15 competitively selected papers. NEW! Conservation Strategies for Archaeologists – an NPI seminar offered in Mount Vernon, VA - April 3-5 in cooperation with Mount Vernon Archaeology. Review the role of conservation in the field and in the laboratory for archaeological projects. Discuss planning and preparation for the care of excavated materials. Learn about the condition of materials upon excavation and "first aid" packing and transport methods for artifacts from both dry and waterlogged contexts. Examine artifact preservation and methods to facilitate interpretation. Learn how to perform simple stabilization techniques such as dewatering waterlogged bone, removing chlorides from objects, and consolidating highly degraded glass, as well as exploring tips for mending vessels. NEW! The Historic Structures III: Planning and Programming course is planned for April 2006 for either Honolulu, HI or Washington, DC. The purpose of this course is to take information learned in Historic Structures I and apply it to the development of typical historic preservation projects. This course will emphasize the roles of project development team members. Roles will include program/project management, cost engineering, design, functional user, maintenance & repair, fire protection, force protection, sustainable design, cultural resources, and SHPO. This course will focus on how to plan and program Historic Structures renovation and maintenance projects at the installation level and civil works project locations.. The Association for Preservation Technology has issued a call for papers for its 2006 conference: "Crossroads in Heritage Conservation – When Modern Becomes Historic." The conference will be held **September 13-16** in **Atlanta, Georgia**. APT 2006 will explore the challenges and rewards of this current perspective on the historic, which includes recent events, diverse cultural perspectives, and innovations in architecture, industry and technology. 2007 Call for Papers: The Archaeological Institute of America will hold its 108th Annual Meeting in **San Diego**, **California**, **January 4-7**, **2007**. For the 2007 Annual Meeting, the program committee is particularly keen to receive submissions on the following topics: European Prehistory; Ancient Near East; and thematic papers from any region or period that address use of sacred space, funerary art and practices, patterns of urbanism, and identifying ethnicity in the physical record. All submissions, of course, must pass the PAMC's vetting process to be put onto the program. As with past meetings, all submissions must be made electronically. The theme for the 10th annual Saving Places conference, "Planning, Growth, and Preservation," will provoke discussion on how to best integrate preservation into planning decisions at all levels. Keynote speakers and sessions will be selected highlighting how preservation can offer creative solutions to growth and sprawl issues through adaptive use, creative infill, and raising appreciation for historic places increasing inherent demand. NEW! National Public Lands Day (NPLD) is an annual event held the last Saturday in September that promotes shared stewardship of our nation's public lands. Through a day of volunteering, NPLD helps build a strong conservation ethic among participants. NPLD is also a great way for installation Resource Managers to get much needed support and funds for cultural and natural resource conservation projects. NPLD projects can connect installation personnel with the outside community by working together to conserve cultural and natural resources on DoD lands.

DoD has taken part in NPLD since 1999 with funding supplied by the Legacy Resource Management Program. In 2005, over 1,600 volunteers at 23 installations participated in NPLD projects. For 2006, DoD Resource Managers may apply for up to \$6,000 in Legacy funding for equipment and materials for an NPLD project. NPLD is coordinated by the National Environmental Education and Training Foundation (NEETF) and applications for event funding are available on the NEETF/NPLD website www.npld.com or by contacting Dena Imbergamo at (202) 261-6467 or Dena@neetf.org. **Application deadline** is **May 31, 2006.** Funding is awarded in early July. In addition to the application form, the NEETF/NPLD website also contains a host of helpful tools including a detailed site manual and media kit

While projects involving cultural resources have always been permissible, **cultural** resource projects will be specifically encouraged for 2006 in light of the 100th Anniversary of the Antiquities Act and the 40th Anniversary of the National Historic Preservation Act. Cultural resources project proposals should include work that can be performed by volunteers on resources that are publicly accessible (on the day of the National Public Lands Day event).
