ACHP POLICY STATEMENT REGARDING
TREATMENT OF BURIAL SITES, HUMAN REMAINS
AND FUNERARY OBJECTS

February 23, 2007, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) adopted the "Policy Statement Regarding Treatment of Burial Sites, Human Remains and Funerary Objects." The new policy statement is available from http://achp.gov/docs/hrpolicy0207.pdf.

From the outset, the Archaeology Task Force, which had been charged by Chairman Nau reconsideration of the ACHP's 1988 "Policy Statement Regarding Treatment of Human Remains and Grave Goods," sought to make any new policy a concise statement that would help Section 106 users navigate the difficult and sensitive issues associated with treatment of human burials. It soon became apparent to the task force that the new policy would benefit from the inclusion of interpretive guidance to clarify and reduce uncertainty about how it should be applied. Thus, the 2007 policy statement consists of a preamble, which establishes the purpose and intent of the policy; eight principles; a concise interpretive discussion of each of the principles; and a definition of key terms.

A fact sheet that answers basic questions about the development, scope and applicability of the policy also has been attached. COLORADO PRESERVATION, INC.: SAVING PLACES CONFERENCE 2007

DENVER, CO – Saving Places 2007: Planning, Growth and Preservation was held in Denver February 7-9, 2007 providing broad exposure and training to a record audience of over 2,000. The conference program included national leaders and policy makers sharing new information and technologies through plenary, educational sessions, workshops, tours and a trade show attracting the largest audience to attend a statewide historic preservation conference.

Colorado Preservation, Inc. is an active, highly visible nonprofit organization dedicated to advancing and promoting historic preservation through education, outreach and technical assistance. *Saving Places* provides a highly visible forum to ensure a better understanding, awareness, and appreciation of the Department of Defense's cultural resource assets and the programs in place to manage these assets.

With the objectives of raising appreciation for historic resources, promoting historic preservation and reuse of historic assets, and advancing cultural resource management through training, networking and exposure, the program included sessions on site management; energy and preservation; heritage tourism; survey; land use planning; creative partnerships; fund raising; new research; technologies; and specific treatments for the protection and enhancement of historic buildings, sites and landscapes. The wide-array of topics and the large audience provided broad exposure for interacting and networking with preservationists and cultural resource managers from across the country.

Civic leaders, elected officials and nationally renowned preservationists comprised the over 180 speakers presenting at the conference who collectively raised awareness and understanding of preservation issues.

Department of Defense programs and projects were shared through prominently displayed exhibits and multiple sessions including tour, educational session and keynote address from DoD Deputy Under Secretary Mr. Philip Grone. Twenty-five DoD staff received training and network opportunities with cultural resource contractors, professionals, and community leaders.

Next year's conference, *Saving Places 2008: Promoting Colorado's Heritage*, will take place in Denver, Wednesday through Friday, February 6-8, 2008.

UPDATED UFC ON ATFP FOR BUILDINGS

The US Army Corps of Engineers, Protective Design Center recently announced the release of Change 1 to Unified Facilities Criteria (UFC) number 4-010-01: DoD Minimum Standards for Buildings. This UFC has been updated with many changes and additions.

While the Historic Preservation section of UFC 4-010-01 remains unchanged, other revised portions of the document may affect the work of DoD cultural resources managers. Section 1-3, Standards and Recommendations, now includes an explanation that the UFC standards are a combination of performance and prescriptive requirements, where in many cases the prescriptive requirements (standoff, glazing thickness) are based on performance standards set forth in other documents. Section 1-4, Intent, now has an explanation on the intent of these standards with regards to bringing existing buildings into compliance over time as major investments are made in them or as leases are renewed such that eventually all inhabited DoD buildings comply with these standards.

AN INFORMAL REQUEST FOR INFORMATION



What Is It?: Building 4248 was completed in 1919 as Camp Knox's Visitor House. The building originally featured 14 visitor guest rooms, lounges, writing rooms and a cafeteria. Initially under the supervision of the Knights of Columbus as part of their WWI support to military and civilian personnel at the camp, the building later served as a hospital annex as early as 1928. During WWII, the building housed HQ, 1st Armored Division. Named "Blakely Hall," in honor of Brigadier General Charles S. Blakely, first commander of the Camp Knox artillery firing center in 1918, the building today contains offices used by Morale, Welfare and Recreation staff. Due to its Spanish Mission Revival architecture, the building is often informally referred to as "The Alamo."

The Issue At Hand: Ft Knox is working with the KY SHPO and stakeholders to rehab the building and restore its exterior to a 1920s appearance.

The recipe differs from [the original recipe] given to me by my grandfather, which was very basic. He had a cabin on the Hancock's "Crick," and occasionally trapped muskrat. One of the admired local dishes is:" ~Michael Devonshire



COLLOQUIAL RECIPE: THE JERSEY "STICKS"

PAN FRIED MUSKRAT

1 Muskrat 1 teaspoon salt Pepper to taste Dry red wine

1 cup barbeque sauce

½ medium vellow onion

1/4 cup coarsely chopped bacon or back fat

DIRECTIONS

Remove scent glands and some, but not all, fat. Brine the muskrat overnight in salted water. Rinse and pat dry, disjoint, and cut into desired size pieces. Place pieces in cast iron or non-stick pan and add water to cover. Add onion. Cook about 45 minutes; reserve meat and onion separately. Heat the bacon/back fat in the pan, add meat and brown one side. Turn, and combine with barbeque sauce in pan. Deglaze pan with red wine and simmer until gravy is thick enough to serve, add reserved onions, pepper and cook until tender. Salt to taste. Next month: Concord Grape Pie
