



## Bothersome Birds

Cowbirds are pests in warblers' nests. Female cowbirds lay their eggs there (and in other birds' nests as well). Sometimes the cowbirds even get rid of some of the warblers' eggs. Then the warbler parents feed the bigger cowbird chicks while their own chicks starve.

Now forest rangers help the warblers by trapping cowbirds and taking them away. Because there are fewer cowbirds around, more young warblers can grow to be adults.

## Hooray for Forest Fires!

Many years ago, forest rangers thought that all forest fires should be put out right away. Now forest rangers in Michigan set fires to burn jack pines when the trees get too tall. The fires get rid of the big, shady trees.

## Pop Go the Pine Cones

During a forest fire, pine cones on tall trees get hot. That makes them pop open. Then seeds hidden in the cones fall out. The ashes from the fire also add minerals to the soil. The minerals help the seeds grow into small pines, which give the warblers new places to nest.
