kanaka kupa

'āina land, environment aliʻi chief, royalty love, compassion, greetings, affection, show kindness aloha deep love, respect of the land, deep love of one's aloha 'āina country aloha kekahi i kekahi kind and compassionate to all whose lives we touch God/Goddess spirit. Higher spiritual power. Ke Akua breath, life hā to be humble ha'aha'a (adj) without breath; (n) foreigner, usually white hā'ole hapa hā'ole part-white person; of part white blood; part white-part Hawaiian person I am Hawaiian he Hawai'i au hele to go, come, walk, set in motion hoʻihi Sacred, respect Hokule'a a navigational star, probably Arcturus; a zenith star above Hawai'i. Recreated ancient sea-faring canoe, completing a Hawai'i - Tahiti round trip using traditional wayfinding (without modern instruments) first in 1976, and continues as a source of pride and rediscovering culture throughout the Pacific. to put to rights; to put in order, shape, correct. Family Ho'oponopono conferences in which relationships are set right guided by a respected haku ho'oponopono through prayer, discussion, confession, repentance, and mutual restitution and forgiveness. skin Ili 'ime 'ike to seek knowledge iwi, kupuna iwi bones, ancestors (fig) Kaho'olawe one of the Hawaiian islands, a sacred place, also called Kanaloa; used as target practice by military, after education and protest by Native Hawaiians, returned to Hawai'i after some clean-up Hawaiian language revival Ka Papahana Kaiapuni Hawaiian person Kanaka Hawai'I kanaka'oiwi native Hawaiian person kanaka maoli native Hawaiian
