

Our troops need to train in settings similar to the real combat environments they will find themselves in. This ensures that when called upon, their fighting skills are second nature.




Maintaining A Natural Environment Is Critical


Navy Region Northwest (NRNW):

The Puget Sound area is home to the Navy's third largest fleet concentration: Naval Air Station Whidbey Island, Naval Station Everett, Naval Magazine Indian Island, and Naval Base Kitsap. N RNW provides support to Naval operating forces throughout the six-state area of Washington, Alaska, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. N RNW is home to approximately 55,000 Navy retirees.



Joint Base Lewis-McChord (JBLM)

JBLM became operational Feb. 1, 2010, when Fort Lewis and McChord Air Force Base merged into one joint base. JBLM units include: I Corps; three of the Army's seven Stryker Brigades; two C-17-equipped Air Force airlift wings; the Western Air Defense Sector; and Madigan Army Medical Center. The base's proximity to interconnected road, rail, sea, and air facilities makes it the U.S. military's premier power projection and generation platform for training, mobilization, and deployments on the West Coast.



United States Army Reserve

The Reserve provides specialized skills to the Nation and the Army with trained-ready units in time of war and national emergencies. In the State of Washington, the Army Reserve has 28 facilities on approximately 170,000 acres of land.



Washington National Guard

The Guard organizes, trains, and equips citizen-soldiers to ensure their quick mobilization within the state or world-wide. Within DoD, the Guard is unique, serving both the Governor and the President in time of crisis. The Army and Air National Guard manage 45,632,000 acres and approximately 250 buildings and is composed of members operating from military facilities in 40 Washington State communities.



Fairchild Air Force Base

Fairchild manages 4,500 acres plus an additional 500,000 acres that are leased to support the U.S. Air Force Survival School. The 92nd and 141st Air Refueling Wings at Fairchild are capable of maintaining an air bridge across the nation and the world in support of military forces. The wings are also capable of providing rapid response to worldwide humanitarian assistance or disaster relief.



Western Regional Medical Command

A military command that supports National Guard and Reserve units in twenty western states. The responsibilities of this Command include readiness training; exercise support; reserve component integration; clinical operations; mobilization and contingency planning; technology integration; communications; business operations resource management and allocations; and security.



Yakima Training Center

The Yakima Training Center covers approximately 324,000 acres, the largest military landspace in Washington State. The primary use is for training tanks/Stryker vehicles, rotary-wing aircraft, and as a firing range for guns, mortars, grenades, and cannons.
