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America's Conservation Enhancement (ACE)

On 1 October 2020, Congress passed the America's Conservation Enhancement (ACE) Act with strong bipartisan support. It is now on the President's desk for signature.

A package of measures authorizing \$1.1 billion in conservation programs relating to wildlife and habitat, ACE is being hailed as a major win for conservation and sportsmen.

It is also a win for the Chesapeake Bay with three important components:

SECTION 109. REAUTHORIZATION OF CHESAPEAKE BAY PROGRAM. This section reauthorizes appropriations for the EPA Chesapeake Bay Program with increases from \$90 million for fiscal year 2020 to \$90.5 million for fiscal year 2021; \$91 million for fiscal year 2022; \$91.5 million for fiscal year 2023; and \$92 million for fiscal year 2024.

SECTION 110. REAUTHORIZATION OF CHESAPEAKE BAY INITIATIVE ACT OF 1998.

This section reauthorizes appropriations of \$3 million for the Chesapeake Bay Gateways and Watertrails Network and the Chesapeake Bay Gateways Grants Assistance Program for each fiscal year through 2025.

SECTION 111. CHESAPEAKE WATERSHED INVESTMENTS FOR LANDSCAPE DEFENSE.

This section authorizes a new grant program administered by the US Fish & Wildlife Service at \$15 million per fiscal years 2021 through 2025.

These authorizations are still subject to annual appropriations, but they provide an important benchmark for funding.

California Will Phase Out Fossil Fuel Based Transportation

California Governor Gavin Newson has issued an executive order N-79-20 setting goals for the state to achieve, consistent with technological feasibility and cost-effectiveness, that:

- 100 percent of in-state sales of new passenger cars and trucks will be zero-emission by 2035,
- for all drayage trucks operating in the state to be zero emission by 2035, and
- 100 percent of medium- and heavy-duty vehicles (trucks, busses) operated in the State be zero-emission by 2045 wherever feasible, and
- 100 percent zero-emission(s) from off-road vehicles and equipment operations in the State by 2035.

The state Air Resources Board shall develop and propose regulations ("strategies" for off-road vehicles and equipment) to achieve these goals.

NATURAL AND CULTURAL RESOURCES

Ocean Dredged Material Disposal Site for the Southern Maine, New Hampshire, and Northern Massachusetts Coastal Region (Final Rule)

EPA is publishing this Final Rule designating the Isles of Shoals North Disposal Site (IOSN) for the purpose of providing an ocean disposal option for possible use in managing dredged material from harbors and navigation channels in the southern Maine, New Hampshire, and northern Massachusetts coastal region.

This action is necessary to serve the long-term need for an Ocean Dredged Material Disposal Site (ODMDS) for the possible future disposal of suitable dredged material from harbors and navigation channels in southern Maine, New Hampshire, and northern Massachusetts. The FEA identifies designation of the IOSN as the preferred alternative from the range of options considered. The Site Management and Monitoring Plan (SMMP) is provided as Appendix G of the FEA.

The site designation is effective for an indefinite period of time. Without designation of this ODMDS, there will not

be an ocean disposal site available to serve this region after December 31, 2021, when the current Congressionallyauthorized term of use for the Cape Arundel Disposal Site (CADS) expires. Use of the IOSN is subject to any restrictions and procedures included in the site designation and the approved SMMP. These restrictions are based on a thorough evaluation of the site pursuant to the Ocean Dumping Regulations, potential disposal activity expected at the site, and consideration of public review and comment. Additional restrictions may be placed on any permit or authorization to use the site.

Regulations for Designating Critical Habitat (Proposed)

The Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) is proposing regulatory amendments to set forth a process for excluding areas from critical habitat designation based on a discretionary exclusion analysis.

The Endangered Species Act, Section 4(b)(2) mandates FWS consideration of the impacts of designating critical habitat and permits exclusions of particular areas following a discretionary exclusion analysis. This rulemaking, if finalized, would only apply to FWS (not to the National Marine Fisheries Service).

Section 4(b)(2) of the Act provides the Secretary the authority to exclude any particular area from a critical habitat designation if the benefits of exclusion outweigh the benefits of inclusion for that area, so long as excluding it will not result in the extinction of the species. Considerations may include economic impact, the impact on national security, and any other relevant impact.

This proposed rulemaking is potentially relevant to FWS reviews for exclusion of critical habitat in areas covered by an installation's Integrated Natural Resources Management Plan (INRMP) or more generally exclusion based on national security impacts in areas not covered under an INRMP.

Comments are due 8 October 2020.

FINAL LEGISLATION

Senate Bill 249 An act to amend Title 7 of the Delaware code relating to the clean air act Title v operating permit program. This Act extends the Clean Air Act Title V Operating Permit Program annual fees for facilities in Delaware,

which have historically expired and been reauthorized by the General Assembly every three years. Existing statutory authorization to collect fees sunsets December 31, 2020. This legislation updates the fee assessments based on the work of the Title V Operating Permit Program Advisory Committee and makes additional clarifying updates to the fee provisions. For 2021-2023, the total fee will be comprised of a base fee, user fee, and a program fee. Base fees are based on the number of staff hours spent on the sources permitting, compliance, and enforcement activities, while the user fee is based on the sources air emissions. The program fee will be assessed based on the total base and user fees. A fee credit implemented to reduce a prior fund balance is allowed to sunset as scheduled. This Act authorizes the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control to collect Title V annual fees for calendar years 2021 through 2023 at which point the authority sunsets and would need to be reauthorized. Effective 1 January 2021.

Effective 11 November 2020.

Effective 1 October 2020.
